This development will provide more privacy and dignity for the patients and families in our care, and will help us to meet the specialist palliative care needs of our growing and ageing community.

The anticipated cost of the build is substantial, and much of this will need to be fundraised. We have faced large sums in the past; the cost of building St Francis Hospice Blanchardstown between 2009 and 2011 was €24.5m. Last December,

thanks to community, corporate and government support, we cleared the final bank loans, a remarkable achievement in just 12 years.

St Francis Hospice was born 34 years ago, with a mission to provide high quality specialist palliative care for the people of North Dublin and surrounding counties. With the unwavering support of our community, our hospice services have flourished and grown.

As we enter this new phase of growth together, the immortal words of Helen Keller remind me that,

"Alone we can do so little, Together we can do so much"

#### Aedin's Story

Whenever anyone mentions St Francis Hospice my first response is always, "They saved my family." That might seem like an odd thing to say, but when you read our story, you will understand how important the support of the hospice was for me and my family.

My husband, Frank, was a patient there 8 years ago. I remember his first few minutes, arriving anxious and upset and being met by compassion and professionalism. He focused on the room layout, to gain some control I think, and in what seemed like seconds a team of carers re-arranged the whole room to his liking, every bit of furniture moved. One of the nurses knelt down beside his chair, took his hand and said. "We're here for you Frank." It was so simple and so kind. The hospice meets you exactly where you are, emotionally and physically, and holds you in place.

Frank, individually, and we as a family, used every physiotherapy, where he worked very hard, and occupational therapy, for him that was painting. We have some treasured pieces that he completed.

service the hospice offered. There were nurses' visits at home before his admission. I started having conversations with Niamh Finucane from the Social Work department about our children and how best to talk to them about what was happening. After his admission Frank was very keen to have lots of

We were fortunate to receive a single room, not available to everyone at the existing hospice in Raheny. Frank was a young man, with young children. and having his own room allowed us private family

themselves and I didn't worry about disturbing other patients. So we could have movie nights, play games, listen to music, do homework and take naps. A little bit of normality in an abnormal time.

I'm delighted that the new hospice development plan has all single, en-suite rooms planned. It's a huge fundraising task but I feel the whole Dublin community is so proud of the work the hospice does that whether it's buying a €3 key ring. raising €50 at a coffee morning or €500 at a pub guiz, we can point at the hospice and say,

"I helped build that."

#### **Growing** to Meet Our Community's Needs





St Francis Hospice Dublin celebrated our 34th anniversary in February 2023 by preparing to lodge planning permission for our next major development: a 24 single bed in-patient unit for our Raheny hospice.

The new in-patient unit will provide privacy, dignity, and higher standards of infection control, as well as much-needed room for family members and friends. It will also increase our bed capacity in Raheny from 19 to 24 beds, an important development as we strive to meet the needs of our growing community.

Our existing in-patient unit in Raheny was built in 1995, entirely funded by donations. The facilities were state of the art in their day, but standards and needs change over time. In particular, the Covid-19 pandemic demonstrated the challenges

of providing high quality care in our three 4-bedded rooms in Raheny.

Those who donated toward the build of our original in-patient unit will be pleased to know that it will go on serving our community when it is eventually re-purposed to house our expanding community palliative care and outpatients and day services teams. About 2 in every 3 of our patients are enabled to remain at home throughout their illness, with the support of these vital services.

The cost of the new build and fit-out is estimated at €29.8m. and we are launching a special fundraising initiative, Living Today, for our wonderful community of North Dublin and surrounding counties to get behind. Please visit our web site to find out more: https://www.sfh.ie/ living-today.

#### **Bereavement Volunteer Programme Grows**

Sometimes when people experience bereavement and loss the world can become a very confusing, strange and hostile place. The St Francis Hospice Dublin Volunteer Bereavement Support Service [VBSS] offers a safe, confidential space for bereaved people to share their experiences.

Being met with kindness and compassion enables even the most wounded and vulnerable of those bereaved, to open up and share their grief. Our volunteers companion them during a time when they need to talk about their loss, identify the aspects of their grief that they are struggling with, and together find a way for the bereaved person to carry their loss and engage in living their life.

We have a wonderful team of specially trained bereavement volunteers, and last year they offered 980 appointments to 262 different clients. This is in addition to the bereavement support provided by our hospice social workers.

Even so, there are growing waiting lists of people who have been bereaved and are requesting support. This is due to two factors: the rising numbers of patients and families under the hospice's care, and the impact of the Covid-19 pandemic, where increased isolation impacted on the experience of illness, caring and bereavement in a way that contributed to people's

With thanks to a philanthropic grant from the Cadbury Foundation, we are currently recruiting 18 new bereavement volunteers to expand our service. They will start their 60-hour training programme in April, and once qualified, they will begin to see clients, with ongoing support from the hospice's social work team.

That evening, when Colin spotted a missed call from St Francis Hospice on his phone, he assumed it was a follow-up call about his volunteering enquiry. Much to his surprise, it was a member of the St Francis Hospice

Fundraising Team ringing to let him know the good news that his ticket had been the first one pulled from the drum. Colin remarked, "I couldn't believe it when Katrina told me I won the car! Amazing, delighted ... can't believe it."

The Hospice Car Draw was a win/win, as it raised more than €128,000 to support the care that St Francis Hospice delivers to members of our community in North Dublin and surrounding counties. A huge thank you to everyone who entered the draw, and congratulations to all our winners.
